As we continue to meet the needs of our students, it is time to take surviving these courses to thriving in these courses. This series was open to any faculty but intended for those faculty members new to online. This was a BlackBoard-free series of professional development sessions. Why BlackBoard-free? The purpose was to talk about online learning – and online learners – at the fundamental level.
12	Support Staff Development Academy	Program Specialists, Administrative Assistants, Business office personnel, and other Staff are critical to the College in their roles, enabling CGTC to be one of the best in our state. This Support Staff Development Academy is a series of professional development sessions intended to provide the skills and knowledge needed to develop the effectiveness of CGTC full-time, non-faculty staff.
44	Destructive Dialogue	This new session discussed primarily written but also verbal interactions with students from faculty and staff that are perceived as rude or disrespectful. Techniques were discussed to minimize these perceptions and maximize positive student exchanges.
18	Critical Thinking	Critical thinking can be defined as the analysis of facts in order to form a judgement. We would all like for our graduates to be able critically think in the workplace; unfortunately, many of our students have not developed that skill in the classroom as yet. This session discusses critical thinking and uses a foundation of five skills that all contribute to the practice of critical thinking. These five skills include Problem-Solving, Decision-Making, Evaluating, Reasoning, and Analyzing.
7	Under-Prepared Students	This session explores the characteristics of under-prepared students. In many cases, we as faculty struggle with understanding the students in our classes; they are not built like we are! How many of us wish students came with better developed critical thinking skills? Math skills that are relevant to the program? Intuition? This session will discuss that under-prepared means and how we might address those challenges.
9	Teaching Students How to Learn	A great many of our students are either first-generation college students, haven't been in school for a great deal of time, or weren't particularly great students the last time they were in a classroom. This session gives suggestions and tips for how to develop our "customers" into "students" by developing their study habits, note-taking, etc.
