# BASIC MACHINING OPERATOR (BMO1), LATHE OPERATOR (LP110

# Proposed Expanded Location: Macon Campus

**Proposed Date of Implementation:** Summer Semester 202216 (May 2022) for BMO1, Fall Semester 202312 (August 2022) for LP11

**Program Description (BMO1):** This program prepares students for entry-level machine shop employment by providing the knowledge and skills in basic machining operations. Instruction is provided in blueprint reading, lathe, mill, and surface grinder operation, mathematical functions, and an introduction to the machine tool industry.

**Program Description (LP11):** Prepares students to use lathes, lathe set up, and lathe tool grinding. Emphasis is placed on cutting threads, boring holes to precise measurements, and cutting tapers. Topics include an introduction to machine tool technology, blueprint reading for machine tool, and basic and advanced lathe operations.

**Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area:** CGTC currently offers the Precision Machining and Manufacturing diploma and several technical certificates, including BMO1 and LP11, at the Warner Robins campus. Both programs are offered for High School Graduation Option B (formally known as SB2) which offers qualified students an alternate path to high school graduation. Students choose to simultaneously earn a high school diploma and a college Associate Degree, or a Technical Diploma, or two (2) Technical Certificates of Credit in a specific career pathway while also meeting specific high school requirements.

**Recommendation:** That the above programs of study be approved for expansion to the Macon Campus.

# LOGISTICS MANAGEMENT SPECIALIST (LM21)

## **Technical Certificate**

## Proposed Date of Implementation: August 2022 (Fall Semester 202312)

Location: Macon Campus and Online

**Program Description:** The Logistics Management Specialist TCC program is a sequence of courses that is designed to prepare students for employment in the field of business logistics. The program focuses on specific occupational courses in the area of logistics that provide an overview of the process from product idea conception to product delivery to the consumer.

Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: The current Logistics Management program was one of the first distribution and materials management programs within the Technical College System of Georgia, as a result the program was institutionally developed. Since the inception of the program, the logistics industry has continued to grow within our service area and many technological advances have occurred within the supply chain, altering the way business is conducted. The new Supply Chain Management degree and diploma program follow a state standard curriculum that will share the same course of study as many other colleges within the Technical College System of Georgia. The proposed curriculum has been updated through the Logistics IFCC to include additional program structure, updated course content, and 5 embedded Technical Certificates of Credit.

# SUPPLY CHAIN SPECIALIST (SCS1)

**Technical Certificate** 

## Proposed Date of Implementation: August 2022 (Fall Semester 202312)

Location: Macon Campus and Online

**Program Description:** The Supply Chain Specialist certificate program provides foundational knowledge of activities associated with getting products from their point of origin to the consumer. Topics include basic fundamentals of supply chain management, including a general knowledge of current management practices in logistics management, E-Commerce (EC), global supply chains, logistics, and transportation.

## **Academic Affairs**

Amy Holloway and Andrea Griner have been invited to speak during the 2022 Georgia Logistics Summit on March 16 in Macon. Dr. Holloway and Ms. Griner will present logistics training opportunities offered by CGTC and TCSG as part of a panel discussion entitled "Inside the Mind: Awakening Your Talent Search."

### **Electronics Technology**

Delta has selected CGTC's Electronics Technology programs to participate in its pipeline program as a preferred training site (Warner Robins and Macon campuses). This program allows graduates from CGTC's AAS program preferred access to potential full-time employee (PFE) status with Delta. Electronic technicians at Delta are currently hired at \$30.97/hr.

### **General Education**

Two of CGTC's general education faculty members are participating in the Spring 2022 Global Solutions Challenge program, an IREX (International Research and Exchanges Board) project that is run and supported by the Stevens Initiative, the US State Department, and the Aspen Institute. The program virtually connects students in the United States with their peers in Iraq and Jordan for cross cultural team building and collaboration on a community sustainability project.

Ms. Joyce Wilson-Young's ENGL 1101 composition students are participating in Global Solutions Conversations. Ms. Wilson-Young is teamed with co-facilitator Dr. Abdullah Yassen, who teaches immigration law at Erbil Polytechnical University in Iraq in preparing students to virtually engage in global issues discussions and in brainstorming sustainable solutions around the United Nations' "17 Sustainable Development Goals." Upon completion of the conversations, students will be awarded two Youth Essential Skills (YES) Badges, earn a certificate for completing the program, gain access to a network of global educators and students, and gain access to Department of State alumni opportunities.

Students in Dr. Will Perez-Martinez's PSY2103 (Human Development) class are exchanging ideas with Iraqi students to develop a podcast related to affordability and access into two-year community and technical colleges. Dr. Will's counterpart, a professor facilitator in Iraq, is completing his PhD via the University of Barcelona in Spain.

### Accreditation

<u>Programmatic Accreditation</u> COGNIA Accreditation – The CGTC Academy

The VP for IE in collaboration with the VP for Adult Education led the COGNIA programmatic Readiness Evaluation for The CGTC Academy. The Evaluation was held virtually on February 16, 2022. We are awaiting the evaluation response notification accepting the Academy into candidacy for accreditation. The CGTC Academy will have two pathways, Career Plus High School Equivalency (CPH) and Dual Achieve Program (DAP) offering participants an opportunity to acquire coursework at the high school level and the post-secondary or College level.

Central Georgia Technical College had 14,646 unduplicated graduates during AY2017-AY2021. Approximately one-third of these CGTC graduates (4,583) subsequently enrolled at another post-secondary institution, with the majority (74%) attending another institution inside Georgia. Middle Georgia State University (739), Georgia Military College (521), and Georgia Southern University (188) enrolled the highest number of CGTC graduates among in-state institutions. Ashland University, OH (151); Strayer University, DC (92); and Southern New Hampshire University, NH (56) enrolled the highest number of CGTC graduates among out-of-state institutions.
