Proposed Date of Implementation: Fall Semester 202512

Location: Macon Campus

Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: The IEC Electrical Apprenticeship certificate program allows students to earn college credit and obtain a national certification by the US Dept. of Labor as an electrician. Employment of electricians is projected to grow 6 percent from 2022 to 2032, faster than the average for all occupations. About 73,500 openings for electricians are projected each year, on average, over the decade. Many of those openings are expected to result from the need to replace workers who transfer to different occupations or exit the labor force, such as to retire.

Program Description: The IEC Electrical Apprentice certificate program is designed to supply classroom instruction in the theories of electrical science. This instruction will serve as a complement to the hands-on electrical apprenticeship training and guidance students are receiving on-the-job with a qualified journeyman.

STUDENT SUCCESS

TEAMS Outreach Center

The TEAMS Outreach Center (TOC) coordinates personalized outreach and wrap around support services to students facing academic barriers or personal hardships. Faculty or staff can submit an alert or students may self-alert. Continued efforts to increase retention are a collaborative effort between faculty, staff, and student support services. The TEAMS Outreach Center tracks data for any gaps in support offerings to ensure that the appropriate resource options are added to the student resources options.

Usage of the alert system continues to steadily increase. The number of alerts increased by 119% in Fall semester, from 2,056 in Fall 2022 to 2,444 in Fall 2023.



Although, the Spring semester is just over 60% complete, the TOC has already received more than 98% of the total alerts from Spring 2023.




Figure 2. *Data current as of March 25, 2024





The FY2025-2028 Perkins V Local Application has been developed and submitted to TCSG for review. The local application is based on CGTC's most recent Perkins Local Area Needs Assessment (PLANAR) and describes the college's future actions for the next four years. Perkins V requires that colleges submit a four-year local application describing how it intends to use Perkins funds to support CTE programs and activities.

As a part of the Perkins V Law States and Colleges are required to analyze their Perkins data and evaluate gaps in performance. Overall, CGTC met all 3 post-secondary CTE measures as shown in Table # below. A deep dive into the data provided information on where a particular measure was not met, more specifically, program performance under measure P2 and performance by specific population under measure P3

Although some programs did not come within 90% of the institutional benchmark for non-traditional enrollment across AY22 into AY23, the improvement strategies deployed have increased rates. Normal time needed to make improvements and to determine if strategies deployed are viable is a three-year period. The AY2023 P3-Non-tradiational Concentration results indicate application of prior-year stakeholder recommendations for improvement should be on-going. A variety of methods were used to collect feedback from students and faculty in separate focus groups and survey responses. Recent results, including perceived barriers and improvement activities are summarized below.

P2- Graduation

Student Barriers:

- Personal reasons
- Bookstore purchasing process
- Lack of communication between faculty and students
- Utilizing online instead of hard copy books causes undue stress
- Lack of empathy for student needs
- High cost associated with health program student participation

Faculty Barriers:

- Timely purchase of up-to-date equipment
- Lack of funding for technology
- Lack of funding supporting all fulltime faculty professional development
- Students not responding to emails or faculty calls in time
- Students not reviewing their Degreeworks

Graduation Rate Improvement Activities:

- a) Provide robust advisor training in conjunction with Academic Affairs, the CARE Center, Health Science Coaches who serve as occupational advisors.
- b) Provide tutoring services for special population students encountering academic difficulty in academic and occupational courses.
- c) Provide up-to-date equipment and technology for under-performing programs and professional development for associated faculty and staff.
- d) Work with occupational student advisory committees to ensure curriculum and equipment meets industry standards.
- e) Provide books, tools, and equipment for student in occupational courses including those with special population students and students with disabilities.

P3- Non-Traditional Concentration

Student Barriers:

- Lack of Awareness of programs
- Faculty not offering activities in courses that relate to males in roles in non-traditional programs
- Lack of Awareness of jobs available in non-traditional fields
- Lack of proper advisement during admissions and orientations

Faculty Barriers:

- Keeping a student enrolled until 12 hours in credit are achieved
- Lack of understanding the terminology of non-traditional programs and under-represented gender students
- Lack of time to participate in external information sessions concerning non-traditional careers
- Lack of knowledge of student barriers

Non-Traditional Concentration Rate Improvement Activities:

- a) Offer non-traditional career fairs to promote enrollment in underrepresented gender fields and programs at CGTC.
- b) Offer aptitude assessments to students by helping students match individual skills with the skills needed for their program.
- c) Produce college-wide outreach materials such as media blasts, web content, flyers, banners, etc. to provide information about the societal and economic benefits of non-traditional careers for under-represented gender students and promote enrollment in non-traditional programs.
- d) Ensure proper new student advisement for program enrollment.

WIOA (Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act)

WIOA Career Advisors conduct career placement activities for participants enrolled in an eligible activity such as being enrolled in a WIOA approved occupational program, high school equivalency or high school diploma. As of March, the Advisors are serving 180 total active participants shown in the table below by funding category. In addition to working with currently active students, follow-up activities are required to gather data on former participants for one year after they complete their program of study. Follow-up is carried out on a quarterly basis as defined by the Middle Georgia Workforce Development Board. The following table shows performance data of WIOA participants for PY23 Quarter 1. Note: Measurable Skills Gain is a real time performance measure counted during the actual program year.


