Location: Milledgeville Campus

Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: Mechatronics personnel, technicians, electricians, millwrights, and other related jobs are charged with inspecting, maintaining, troubleshooting, and repairing commercial and industrial mechanical and electrical systems. These systems are found in manufacturing applications, assembly lines, and production facilities. The complex machinery found in each of these situations need technicians to install, service, troubleshoot, maintain, and repair machinery in order for the companies to maintain a high level of productivity. Industrial machinery mechanics, machinery maintenance workers and millwrights held about 408,300 jobs in 2008. 45,200 of these jobs were held by millwrights, with the largest concentration of workers in manufacturing and construction industries. Industrial mechanics held about 287,700 jobs, while machinery maintenance workers accounted for 75,400 jobs. Many of both types of workers were employed in the manufacturing sector in industries such as food processing, chemical processing, fabricated metal product, machinery, and motor vehicle and parts manufacturing. Additionally, about 10% work in wholesale trade, mostly for dealers of industrial equipment. Manufacturers often rely on these dealers to make complex repairs to specific machines. About 9% of mechanics work for the commercial and industrial machinery and equipment repair and maintenance industry, often making site visits to companies to repair equipment. Employment is expected to grow more slowly than average, and applicants with broad skills in machine repair and maintenance should have favorable job prospects.

Program Description: The Mechatronics Technology Degree Program is designed for the student who wishes to prepare for a career as a Mechatronics technician/electrician. The program provides learning opportunities that introduce, develop and reinforce academic and technical knowledge, skill, and attitudes required for job acquisition, retention, and advancement. Additionally, the program provides opportunities to retrain or upgrade present knowledge and skill. The Degree program teaches skills in Mechatronics Technology providing background skills in several areas of industrial maintenance including electronics, industrial wiring, motors, controls, PLC's, instrumentation, fluid power, mechanical, pumps and piping, and computers. Graduates of the program receive a Mechatronics Technology Degree that qualifies them for employment as industrial electricians or Mechatronics technicians.

Facilities Projects

- Milledgeville EV and Mechatronics Labs Renovation is moving forward, with a projected completion around May-June 2025. Construction documents have been approved by Georgia State Finance and Investment Commission (GSFIC) Design Review Group (DRG) and the State Fire Marshal. Demolition is complete, and construction began in December.
- The FY 25 Capital Outlay project (renovation of several Macon campus buildings) architect and contractor project kick-off is scheduled for March 13. Design document submission is projected for late 2rd quarter 2025, with construction commencing one month following DD approval. The construction portion will likely take 1 year +.
- The FY26 capital outlay request was forward to TCSG, and the request is listed as a "supplemental project." The request is for funding to make significant infrastructure improvements:
 - Major HVAC components and controls
 - o Roofs
 - Parking lots
 - Fire Alarm system upgrades
 - Ground water intrusion remediation
 - These projects are internally estimated at \$6.7MM plus escalation
- The request shown above is also being submitted as a part of a System-Wide Critical Infrastructure Supplemental Major Repair and Renovation (MRR) funds request.

Internal Controls Visit

CGTC will have a Perkins Internal Control Review in Spring 2025. The IE Team will be meeting with faculty and staff paid by Perkins funds and other personnel to go over the Internal Controls process and expectations.
