NOTE:

Currently, the Carpentry, Construction Management, and Electrical Technology Programs utilize standards that are aligned to the National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER). This requires faculty to utilize NCCER course materials and students must pay additional per course fees to access the NCCER learning management system for tests, etc. Our faculty have found that the current NCCER materials do not reflect the most adequate course materials (texts, resources, etc.) that are available for these subjects. Furthermore, our Program Advisory Committee members do not feel that NCCER materials and credentialing are vital for a well-prepared workforce. As such, it is recommended that these programs revert to existing TCSG course standards that do not require the use of NCCER materials, portal access, and additional course fees. Reversion to the aforementioned standards will also bring the inclusion of four new imbedded Technical Certificates of Credit (TCC).

General Information

ORTHO VECTR Accelerated Program

Since the program launched on February 18, 2025, we have successfully completed three cohorts, with the most recent cohort finishing on February 6, 2026. Across these cohorts, a total of 21 students have completed the program and 100% of participants passed the Registered Orthopedic Exam, all scoring 70 or above, with the highest score to date being an impressive 92.

Beyond certification success, the program is already making a meaningful workforce impact. Four graduates have reported employment outcomes, including:

One graduate employed at Middle Georgia Orthopedics as a Medical Assistant/Orthotech, actively assisting physicians with Platelet-Rich Plasma (PRP) injections, a regenerative treatment using a patient's own concentrated platelets to accelerate healing of injured tendons, ligaments, muscles, and joints.

Two graduates currently employed with OrthoGA as Orthotechs, contributing directly to orthopedic patient care.

One graduate employed at the VA Hospital in Columbia, South Carolina as an Orthotech (GS-6 level), earning \$46,000–\$48,000 annually, with a planned promotion to GS-7 within one year.

These outcomes reflect not only the rigor and quality of the ORTHO VECTR Accelerated Program, but also its growing reputation as a pipeline for skilled, job-ready orthopedic professionals.

We are incredibly proud of our students and grateful for the continued support that makes this program possible. The momentum is strong, and we look forward to building on this success as future cohorts' progress.

Transfer Day

Academic Affairs hosted Titan Transfer Day on Tuesday, March 3, 2026 on the Warner Robins Campus and it was a tremendous success, bringing together students, faculty and representatives from a wide range of colleges and universities. The following schools participated: Morehouse College, Brenau University, Georgia Southern University, University of Phoenix, Oglethorpe University, Wesleyan College, Mercer University and Kennesaw State University. Over 120 students had the opportunity to explore transfer pathways, ask questions about admissions and financial aid, and learn more about academic programs that align with their goals.

Several parents attended with their student and were very grateful for the opportunity to speak to these universities. One student traveled from the Milledgeville campus to attend and one 8th grader attended getting a jump start on their academic future.

A special thank you Shannon Durham for leading this initiative and Andrew Hall and Nandhi Mathis assisting Ms. Durham. I also want to thank Student Services and the Marketing Department for their help in making this day a success.

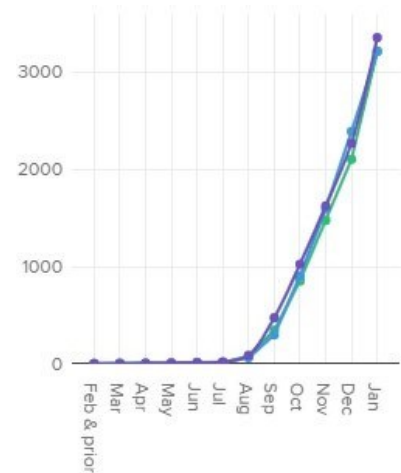

Facilities Projects

- The FY 25 Capital Outlay project (renovation of several Macon campus buildings) construction documents review by the Design Review Group (DRG) of Georgia State Financing and Investment Commission (GSFIC) is projected to be complete March 9, 2026. Once approved, the work can be re-estimated and commence once pricing is agreed-upon.
- The FY27 capital outlay requests to renovate the remaining portions of Building A in Milledgeville (est. 9.855 MM) and renovate Buildings A and B in Warner Robins (est. 22.87 MM) are now being estimated by an independent pricing consultant.
- The Milledgeville welding lab project is moving forward. Demolition of the space is complete. Design documents are in final review by GSFIC, and the projected commencement of construction is early April. The expectation is that classes will begin mid-August (beginning of fall semester). This project uses residual funds from the prior EV/Mechatronics renovation project, and current estimates are ~\$795K, not including furniture, fixtures, and equipment.
- The Governor's FY 26 Amended budget recommends \$48MM (cash) for additional major rehabilitation and renovation projects among TCSG colleges. The budget bill is pending the Governor's signature. CGTC is slated to receive an initial allocation of ~\$2.6MM. The requested projects included two re-roofs, two building HVAC system replacements, and a parking/circulation project.

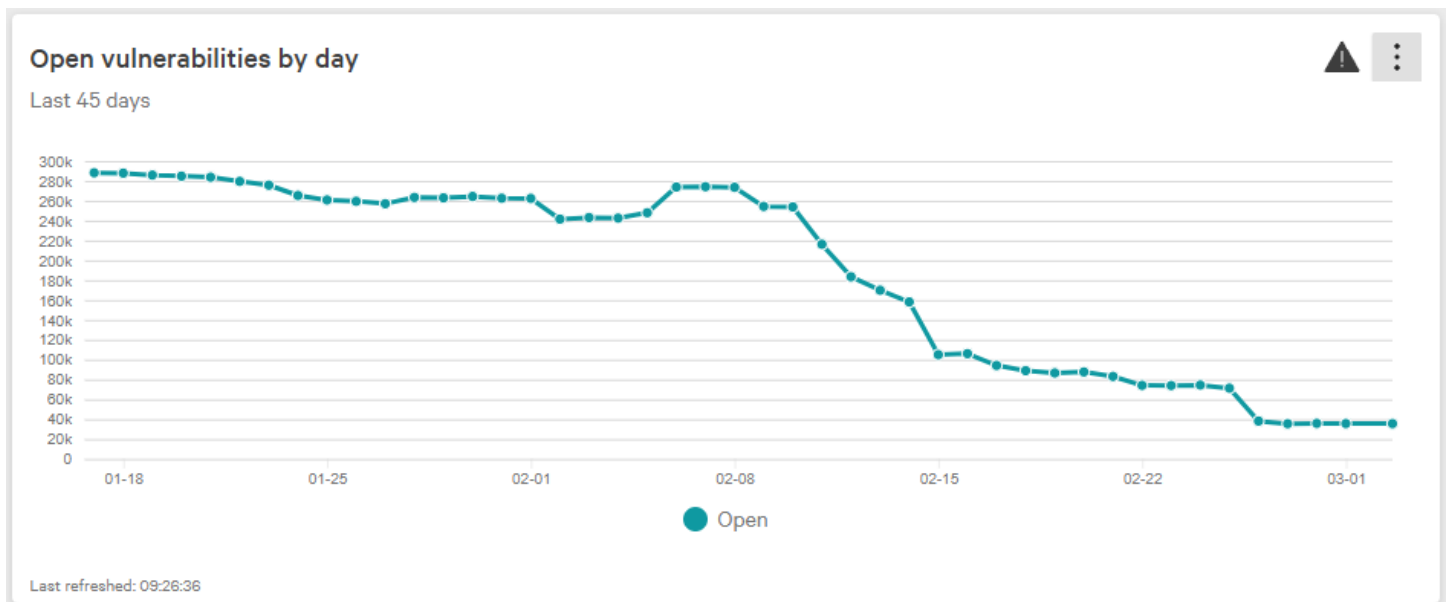
New Full-Time Employee

Professional Development

Implementation of the Emergency Preparedness Video Guide was supported by IE to ensure full compliance with the CGTC faculty and staff. To date, 746 have completed the training; while the video will be available, the window for faculty and staff completion closes next week.

Artificial Intelligence has been an important topic for professional development for faculty and staff. A series was begun last semester called AI for US and continued into the Spring semester. The sessions to date are: AI Introduction, AI for Teachers, Teaching AI Literacy, AI in the Office, AI Using Microsoft Office, AI in Student Careers, Improving Student Engagement with AI, How We Use AI, and Using AI with Excel.

Workshops for the Academic Affairs unit have been held to improve the quality of the annual Professional Development Plans. Ten workshops were scheduled, and through nine of these, there have been 251 participants thus far.

A Lunch and Learn: Institutional Awareness series has focused on the great variety of student supports provided by the College. These sessions are 15 minutes in length and attempt to introduce topics during lunch; sessions are recorded for viewing at later times. Those topics covered have been Library Services, WIOA, Titan Advisement, Special Populations, TEAMS, Veterans Services, and Foundation Scholarships.
