## GENERATIVE AI: PRINCIPLES AND PRACTICE (GAP1)

Technical Certificate of Credit

**Proposed Date of Implementation: Fall Semester 202712**

**Location:** Warner Robins, Milledgeville, and Macon Campuses; Online

**Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area:** Generative artificial intelligence (GenAI) is evolving rapidly, influencing both developmental trends in technology and occupational trends in the workforce. The occupational trends include growth in AI-related jobs, demand for AI specialists, machine learning engineers, and data scientists continues to rise (Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2025). The demand for entry-level AI roles is growing, but the landscape is evolving. While AI is automating some traditional entry-level tasks, new opportunities are emerging in AI literacy, model training, and AI-assisted workflows.

**Program Description:** This program provides a comprehensive foundation in generative AI, focusing on its methods, prompt engineering, and ethical considerations. Participants will gain essential skills in leveraging generative AI technologies effectively and responsibly. The curriculum covers the core processes behind generative AI, techniques for crafting and refining prompts, and an in-depth exploration of ethical practices and societal impacts. Graduates will be equipped to navigate and apply generative AI in diverse, real-world contexts.

Skills will include gathering, preparing, inputting, and other requirements according to a prescription under the supervision of a licensed Pharmacist.**

### Nursing Update

January – March 2026 NCLEX-PN update: First-time test takers for this date range is 33/36 for a pass rate of 91.67%. There were 2/2 repeat test takers for 100% resulting in 35/38 passing for 92.11%.

January – March 2026 NCLEX-RN update: First-time test takers for this date range is 21/26 for a pass rate of 80.77%. There were 3/4 repeat test takers for 75% resulting in 24/30 passing for 80.00%.

These results arrived on April 6, 2026; Dr. Wynne and Dr. Willcox will be reviewing these reports more closely this week.

### Georgia Master Teaching Experience

Georgia Master Teacher Experience (GMTE) is hosted each year at Southern Regional Technical College. Teachers from the Technical College System with expertise in various disciplines gathered in Thomasville, Georgia for an exchange of learning, teaching, and philosophy. Participants shared experiences, strategies, and instructional methods in the quest to improve teaching. The focus of discussion and activities for the entire week was on innovations and problems of instruction in technical college education. The mission of the Georgia Master Teacher Experience is to improve instruction by rejuvenating faculty through interdisciplinary collaboration so that they can return to their school and make a greater impact.

CGTC sends the Rick Perkins Award (RPA) Instructor of the Year and if space is available will choose a second faculty member from the RPA participants. CGTC nominated Deryk Stoops and Amanda Cobb to

attend GMTE 2026 this past March. Dr. "Kate" Mirzakulova also attended this year's experience as the State RPA winner. Each attendee returned with very positive comments about their experiences.

### Dr. Kate

GMTE was such a special experience for me. It really helped me grow, not just as an instructor, but as a person. It gave me time to reflect on my teaching and reminded me why I am so passionate about what I do.

### TCSG & CGTC Fix Fest Results (for blackboard Master course Accessibility)

On March 19th, Academic Affairs faculty participated in "Fix Fest," hosted by TCSG GOLD (Georgia Online Learning & Development, formerly GVTC). During a 12-hour period, faculty from each TCSG college competed for most accessibility improvements in Blackboard. CGTC finished in 10th place for Total Number of Accessibility Improvements and 5th place for Overall Percentage Improvement in Accessibility. Fix Fest is in conjunction with the college's continuous improvement program and our ongoing commitment to provide accessible electronic content to students. The college's accessibility initiative runs in tandem with Federal accessibility guidelines and in anticipation of the April 24, 2026 Federal Guideline requiring large colleges to have accessible websites and apps. A huge thank you to all the faculty who participated in improving courses for our students. CGTC faculty will continue the improvement work for 100% completion.

### **IPEDS** (Integrated Post-Secondary Education Data System)

CGTC met its obligation for the Spring IPEDS collection 2025-2026 which was closed March 28, 2026 prior to the April 1<sup>st</sup> deadline. Spring collection included data uploads in Human Resources, Finance, and Fall Enrollment. As an institution offering Pell (Title IV), the College is required to participate in the \*NCES IPEDS survey data collection annually. These data provide consumers with details supporting educational activities. (\*National Center for Education Statistics)

### **SACSCOC** (Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges)

#### **PEP – Prison Education Program**

The College underwent a substantive change on-site review on March 23 – 25, 2026 to gain approval to offer the Prison Education Program (PEP) at two prisons, Walker State and Dooly State. Approvals provide the opportunity for the College to offer Pell to incarcerated individuals. A committee of peers from neighboring States reviewed our PEP Compliance Report documents for the two sites and unanimously agreed with our compliance statement on all standards. There were no recommendations and the Committee will submit both reports to the SACSCOC Board of Trustees for final decision in June. The College has now undergone all the steps necessary to gain its first two PEP sites. In accordance with Federal and accreditation requirements, we can now offer Pell at additional PEP sites without undergoing the extensive process for approval; however, other substantive change actions may apply to new locations.

### ***Apprenticeship***

In Fall 2025, WorkSource Middle Georgia was awarded a \$250,000 Top State for Talent Grant to build pre-apprenticeship/apprenticeships pipelines for manufacturing, healthcare and education in and create career pathways with sustainable wages & long-term regional impact serving 100 apprentices. CGTC WIOA Career Advisors will provide outreach and case management for apprentices in the Local Workforce Delivery Area (LWDA) 11 attending CGTC. Registered apprentices will be coded as an apprentice and tracked in the WorkSource Georgia Portal.

As of March 2026, the Advisors are serving 16 total active participants as shown in Table 12 below.

# Strategic Initiatives Update

- On March 10, 2026, representatives from the Central Georgia Technical College’s Strategic Initiatives Division, Enrollment Services Division, and Health Sciences Division met with Ms. Laura Rackley, Assistant Superintendent of Monroe County Schools and the CEO of the Monroe County College and Career Academy, and Mr. Eric Wilson, President/CEO of MedPro EMS and CGTC Board Member, to discuss the launch of the Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) program. During the meeting it was shared that CGTC had secured grant funds to fully equip the EMT Lab at MCCA, to include an ambulance simulator. We are excited about our first satellite program of the Healthcare High School Initiative.
- On March 18, 2026, Dr. Tatrabian Jackson observed the competitive selection process for college students applying to Health Sciences programs. This observation provided valuable insight into how candidates for “Competitive Selection Programs” are evaluated and selected.
- On March 25, 2025 the Senate version of the budget, which included \$5 million for healthcare equipment for CGTC, was released. The following information is included to provide context and transparency on how this request for funding evolved. One topic that required a discussion with Bloomberg was the \$5,000,000 in healthcare equipment that was presented in the original grant request. One suggestion that emerged from those discussions was to reduce the number of available programs, which would lower the overall equipment costs and allow us to direct more funds to other grant activities. CGTC determined that this option was incongruent with the spirit of the commitment we made to our school district partners and to our community. Therefore, the College sought and received permission from the Technical College System of Georgia to bypass the normal state of Georgia Executive Branch funding request process and sent a proposal directly to the House and Senate. Upon receipt of the proposal on March 2, House Ways and Means Chairman Shaw Blackmon added \$2,600,000 of the funds to the House version of Georgia's FY27 budget a few days before the House budget vote, and Senator Larry Walker III (President Pro Tempore of the Georgia State Senate) worked diligently to add the other portion of the funds in the Senate version of the budget. As a result, the Senate version of the budget has the full \$5,000,000 of funding for equipment for all 15 of the originally proposed programs that CGTC will offer as a part of the healthcare workforce initiative.
