CERTIFIED PERSONAL TRAINER FAST TRACK (CP81)

Technical Certificate of Credit

Proposed Date of Implementation: Fall Semester 202712

Location: Warner Robins Campus

Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: Provides additional training for Physical Therapy Assistant degree students in their gap semester and for student athletes to give them a more closely related credential to their program of study for employability once they transfer on from CGTC. Completion of CP81 allows a student to sit for the ACE personal trainer exam. Growth plus replacement needs for Fitness Trainers and Aerobics Instructors in Georgia are estimated to average about 270 openings annually from 2020-2030. Employment for Fitness Trainers and Aerobics Instructors is expected to increase annually by 3.6% in Georgia from 2020 to 2030, an annual increase of 1,450 jobs.

Program Description: The Certified Personal Trainer - Fast Track TCC program is designed to provide the graduate with the knowledge, skills, and attitudes to practice personal training in various settings. The goals and objectives of the program are guided by, but not limited to, the criteria and guidelines set forth by the American Council on Exercise. Upon completing the program and obtaining CPR/AED certification with a live skills check, graduates are eligible to take the ACE Personal Trainer Certification exam. The program can be completed in one semester; therefore, graduates are quickly prepared to enter the workforce.

Facilities Projects

- The FY 25 Capital Outlay project (renovation of several Macon campus buildings) construction documents review by the Design Review Group (DRG) of Georgia State Financing and Investment Commission (GSFIC) is projected to be complete by June 12, 2026. After value engineering, the project construction Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) is within the stated cost limitation of \$14MM.
 - The FY 25 state budget authorized \$17.5 MM for design and construction
 - The FY 26 state budget authorized \$1.64 MM for new equipment
 - ICB was under contract in February 2025
 - The projected construction duration is 16 months
- The FY28 capital outlay request to renovate the remaining portions of Building A in Milledgeville (est. \$8.65 MM) will be submitted by June 15 for consideration by TCSG leadership and Board.
- The Milledgeville welding lab project is moving forward. Demolition of the space is complete. The current schedule indicates material completion on July 30, and the expectation is that classes will begin mid-August (beginning of fall semester). This project uses residual funds from the prior EV/Mechatronics renovation project, and current estimates are ~\$795K, not including furniture, fixtures, and equipment.
- The Governor approved \$48MM (FY 26 Amended) for additional major rehabilitation and renovation projects among TCSG colleges. The approved CGTC projects (\$2.6MM) include two re-roofs, two building HVAC system replacements, and a parking/circulation project.

General Information

Office 365

Older versions of Microsoft Office are reaching end of life and end of support in October. The Information Technology department has started deploying Microsoft Office 365 to college owned computers. As of June 1st, 1,313 computers have Office 365 while 2,021 computers still have older versions installed. The Information Technology department is working with individual employees and academic divisions to schedule the remaining upgrades.

Cybersecurity

Firewalls

A new pair of firewalls, provided by TCSG, were installed, configured, and upgraded. We will be migrating all of our network traffic to the new firewalls on June 3rd. Once we know the new firewalls are working correctly, we will decommission the existing firewalls.

Phishing Attack

CGTC, along with other TCSG colleges and schools across the country, were the subject of a phishing attack that started on May 13th. We believe the attack was initiated by a data breach of Instructure. While we do not use any of the products that were included in the data breach, we believe the attackers used the news of the breach as a starting point for their attack. We worked to remove several hundred thousand malicious messages from our systems. We do know of a few users, primarily students, who fell for the phish. As soon as we saw indicators of compromise (IoC) we worked to secure the accounts. Aside from cluttering our users inboxes, and a few outbound phishing messages, we do not have any indication of substantial damage or actively compromised accounts in our network.

- On May 4, 2026, a virtual meeting was held with representatives from Bloomberg, Harvard, and Central Georgia Technical College, including Dr. Ivan Allen and Dr. Mark Scott, to discuss grant requirements and evaluation processes. Unified data collection instruments will be used across the 13 Healthcare High School sites.
- On May 5, 2026, Dr. Mark Scott provided an update on the Healthcare High School initiative to the Centerville Rotary Club. The club members were particularly interested in filling the need for healthcare workers in central Georgia.
- On May 12, 2026, Dr. Deborah Burks received notification from SACSCOC recognizing a substantive change and adding the Houston STEM and Career Academy as a site for 50% or more of a program's offerings.
- On May 20, 2026, Dr. Mark Scott met virtually with Jeff Morehouse, with the North East Tennessee Healthcare High School Initiative, for a follow-up discussion on school-year outcomes. A total of 217 students were accepted for the upcoming Fall semester, bringing overall enrollment to 507 students. Last school year included only 9th- and 10th-grade students. Jeff Morehouse shared challenges experienced throughout the year and discussed the upcoming Bloomberg Philanthropies conference, where all 13 Healthcare High School grant recipients will be in attendance.
- On May 28, 2026, the third and final appendix for the Bloomberg grant agreement was submitted, outlining launch milestones and target dates for the required reporting metrics.
