CYBER FORENSICS TECHNOLOGY (CFT3)

Associate of Applied Science

Proposed Date of Implementation: Spring Semester 202714

Location: Warner Robins, Macon, and Milledgeville Campuses

Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: CGTC's Computer Information Advisory Committee recommended approval for the Associate of Applied Science (AAS) in Cyber Forensics Technology. U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics projects a 35.5% growth rate for information security analysts through 2028, driven by complex and escalating cyber threats. Regional job market scans for 'Computer Security', 'Information Security', and 'Computer Forensics' in the CGTC service area revealed over 300 active job openings.

Program Description: The Cyber Forensics Technology associate degree will prepare students for current jobs as well as provide them with an academic path of completing a bachelor's degree at a four-year institution. This program will help students develop a unique set of Cyber Forensics skills and abilities such as monitor an organization's networks for security breaches and investigate a violation when one occurs; Install and use software, such as firewalls and data encryption programs, to protect sensitive information; prepare reports that document security breaches and the extent of the damage caused by the breaches; conduct penetration testing, which is when analysts simulate attacks to look for vulnerabilities in their systems; research the latest information technology (IT) security trends; develop security standards and best practices for an organization; recommend security enhancements to management or senior IT staff. Work roles that a graduate of this program will be prepared for include Digital Forensics Investigations Associate, Threat Intelligence Analyst, Cyber Forensics Examiner, Cyber Crime Analyst.

Proposed Date of Implementation: Spring Semester 202714

Location: Warner Robins, Macon, and Milledgeville Campuses

Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: The college requests to offer this program to certified firefighters who want to earn a Fire and Emergency Services Occupation AAS degree to help with promotions. Students will submit a PLA application to receive occupational course credit, then complete the General Education courses.

Certified firefighters continue studying to improve their job performance and prepare for promotion examinations. To progress to higher level positions, they acquire expertise in advanced firefighting equipment and techniques, building construction, emergency medical technology, writing, public speaking, management and budgeting procedures, and public relations. Opportunities for promotion depend upon the results of written examinations, as well as job performance, interviews, and seniority.

Program Description: The Fire & Emergency Services Occupation degree program is designed to prepare students for entry level employment in the public safety areas of fire service and emergency medical services. Upon completion of the Fire & Emergency Services Occupation degree, students may be eligible for certification and/or licensure in the following areas: Firefighter I, Firefighter II, EMT and AEMT.

Proposed Date of Implementation: Spring Semester 202714

Location: Warner Robins, Macon, and Milledgeville Campuses

Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: The college requests to offer this embedded TCC program to certified firefighters who want to earn college credit toward a Fire and Emergency Services Occupation AAS degree or Fire and Emergency Services Occupation diploma to help with promotions. Students will submit a PLA application to receive occupational course credit, then complete the General Education courses in the Fire and Emergency Services Occupation AAS or the Fire and Emergency Services Occupation diploma to further their education and opportunities for promotion.

Program Description: The Firefighter II Technical Certificate of Credit program is conducted in cooperation with the Georgia Fire Academy and Georgia Firefighter Standards and Training to ensure graduates have the skills, knowledge and credentials to serve as firefighters in paid and volunteer fire departments. The certificate builds upon skills and knowledge acquired in the Firefighter I certificate and parallels the Advanced Firefighter Curriculum being developed by the Georgia Fire Academy. Students must be a graduate of Firefighter I Technical Certificate of Credit or NPQ Firefighter I Certified. Program graduates receive a Firefighter II Technical Certificate of Credit. Note: Candidate must be certified at the state basic Firefighter I level to be eligible for NPQ Firefighter II certification.

Proposed Date of Implementation: Spring Semester 202714

Location: Dual Enrollment Locations

Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: This certificate provides high school juniors and seniors in the middle Georgia who want to pursue a career in education the knowledge and skills to transition into paraprofessional roles.

Program Description: The Foundations of Education Technical Certificate of Credit introduces students to the field of education and the role of teachers in supporting student learning. The program is designed for dual enrollment students who are interested in exploring careers in education and gaining an early understanding of the teaching profession. Through coursework that examines current issues in education, sociocultural perspectives, and the teaching and learning process, students will develop foundational knowledge of the education field and the responsibilities of educators in today's schools. The courses included in the certificate are part of the Associate of Science in Education program and are designed to transfer into future education programs. This allows students to earn college credit while exploring the teaching profession and provides a pathway for continued study in the field of education. While dual enrollment students are an anticipated population, the program is open to all eligible students who meet admission requirements.

DIAGNOSTIC MEDICAL SONOGRAPHY (DMS3)

Associate of Applied Science

Proposed Date of Implementation: Spring Semester 202714

Location: Houston STEM Academy

Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: Central Georgia Technical College secured \$10M from Bloomberg Philanthropies and public-private investments to launch the regional healthcare workforce initiative and expand training programs through the new STEM/Allied Health Academy in Houston County.

Program Description: The Diagnostic Medical Sonography Associate Degree program is a sequence of courses that provide educational opportunities to individuals within didactic and clinical environments. These educational opportunities will enable them to gain the skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary to graduate and become successful entry-level employees within the field of Diagnostic Medical Sonography. The profession requires critical thinking skills, judgment, and the ability to provide appropriate health care services. Sonographers use high-frequency sound waves to produce dynamic visual pictures of internal body structures. Physicians evaluate the images to make a medical diagnosis. Course work includes sonographic physics, sonographic identification of normal and abnormal anatomy, physiology, pathology, and pathophysiology of the abdomen, pelvis, and small parts of the adult, pediatric, and fetal patient, clinical application courses, interventional sonography, journal, and case study reviews, and comprehensive registry reviews.

RESPIRATORY CARE (RCT3)

Associate of Applied Science

Proposed Date of Implementation: Spring Semester 202714

Location: Houston STEM Academy

Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: Central Georgia Technical College secured \$10M from Bloomberg Philanthropies and public-private investments to launch the regional healthcare workforce initiative and expand training programs through the new STEM/Allied Health Academy in Houston County.

Program Description: The Respiratory Care degree is a sequence of courses that prepare students for careers in the field of respiratory care. Learning opportunities develop academic and professional knowledge and skills required for job acquisition, retention, and advancement. The program emphasizes specialized training in areas such as pulmonary and cardiac pharmacology, medical gases, humidity/aerosol therapy, positive pressure ventilation, incentive spirometry, patient assessment, postural drainage, percussion/vibration, assessment of diseases and conditions, critical respiratory care, advanced critical care monitoring, pulmonary function testing, and pediatric and neonatal respiratory care. Program graduates receive a Respiratory Care associate degree, qualifying them to take the examinations to become a Registered Respiratory Therapist. Students may become certified by taking the Entry Level Certification Examination administered by the National Board for Respiratory Care. Upon successfully completing the Certification (CRT) Exam, the graduate is eligible to take both parts of the Registry (RRT) Exams. To work in Georgia, all respiratory care practitioners must apply and be granted a license. The only way to obtain a license is to pass at least the Entry Level Certification Exam.

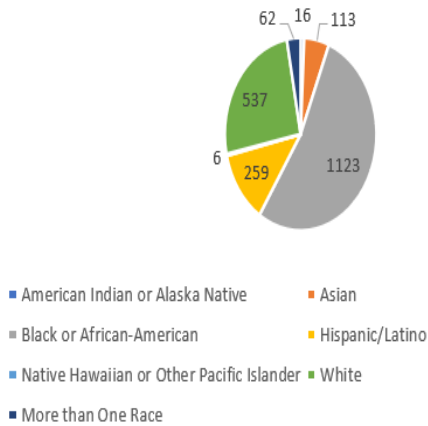

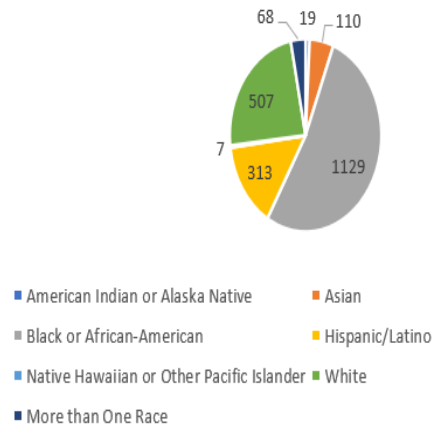
FY26 Demographic Analysis:

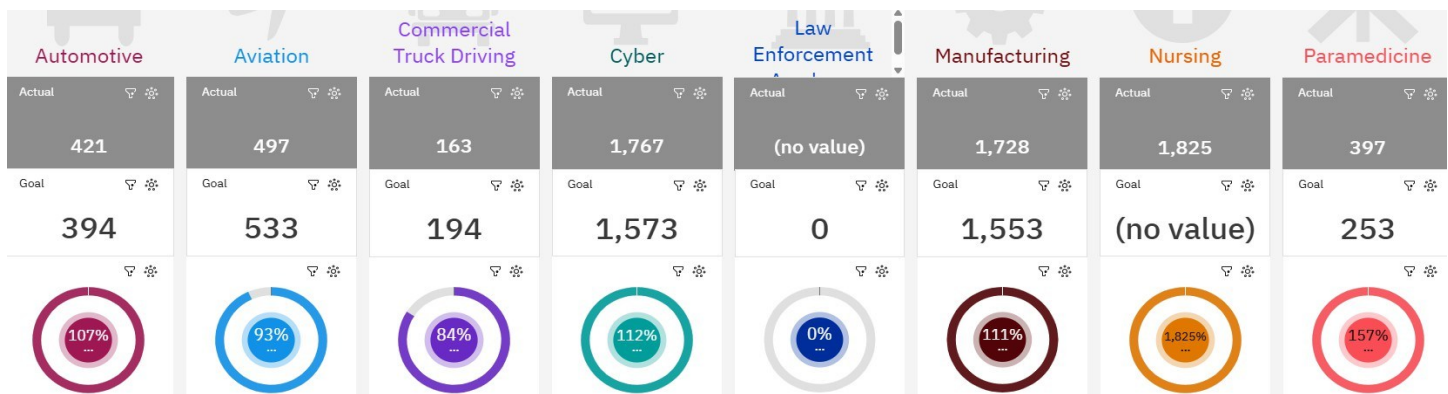

Facilities Projects

- The FY 25 Capital Outlay project (renovation of several Macon campus buildings) construction has commenced. The construction manager (ICB Construction) mobilized on August 3. This project is projected to complete ~ December, 2027. The total investment is ~ \$19.1MM.
- The FY28 capital outlay request to renovate the remaining portions of Building A in Milledgeville (est. \$12.55 MM) has been submitted for consideration by TCSG leadership and Board.
- The Milledgeville welding lab project is now materially complete and in the punch-list phase. The project is on-time and under budget. Classes are slated to begin August 18, and the program is at capacity for the fall. This investment is approximately \$800K for the renovation, and this figure does not include furniture, fixtures, and equipment.
- The supplemental Major Repair and Renovation (MRR) projects are now moving forward. The approved CGTC projects (\$2.6MM) include a re-roof, a HVAC system replacement, and a parking/circulation project.

General Information

Office 365

Office 2021 is reaching end of life and support in October. We are migrating all devices that have Office 2021 to either Office 365 or Office 2024. Office 2024 is only being used on 'public' computers used by people that do not have CGTC accounts.

Warner Robins Quads

The Audio/Video system in the Warner Robins quads has been replaced with new equipment. The new equipment does not require users to log into a computer to select input sources or project on the screens. The new system is not as flexible as the old system was but it is much easier for untrained users to operate.

Macon Trade and Industry Renovation

All technology has been removed from the Phase 1 section of the Macon Trade and Industry area. In order to provide network connectivity to the Automotive lab in C building, which will remain in use during Phase 1, we have installed a low cost wireless bridge to support the faculty and students using that lab.

Cybersecurity

Chart 1. FY27 Perkins Funding Distribution Chart by Division/Unit

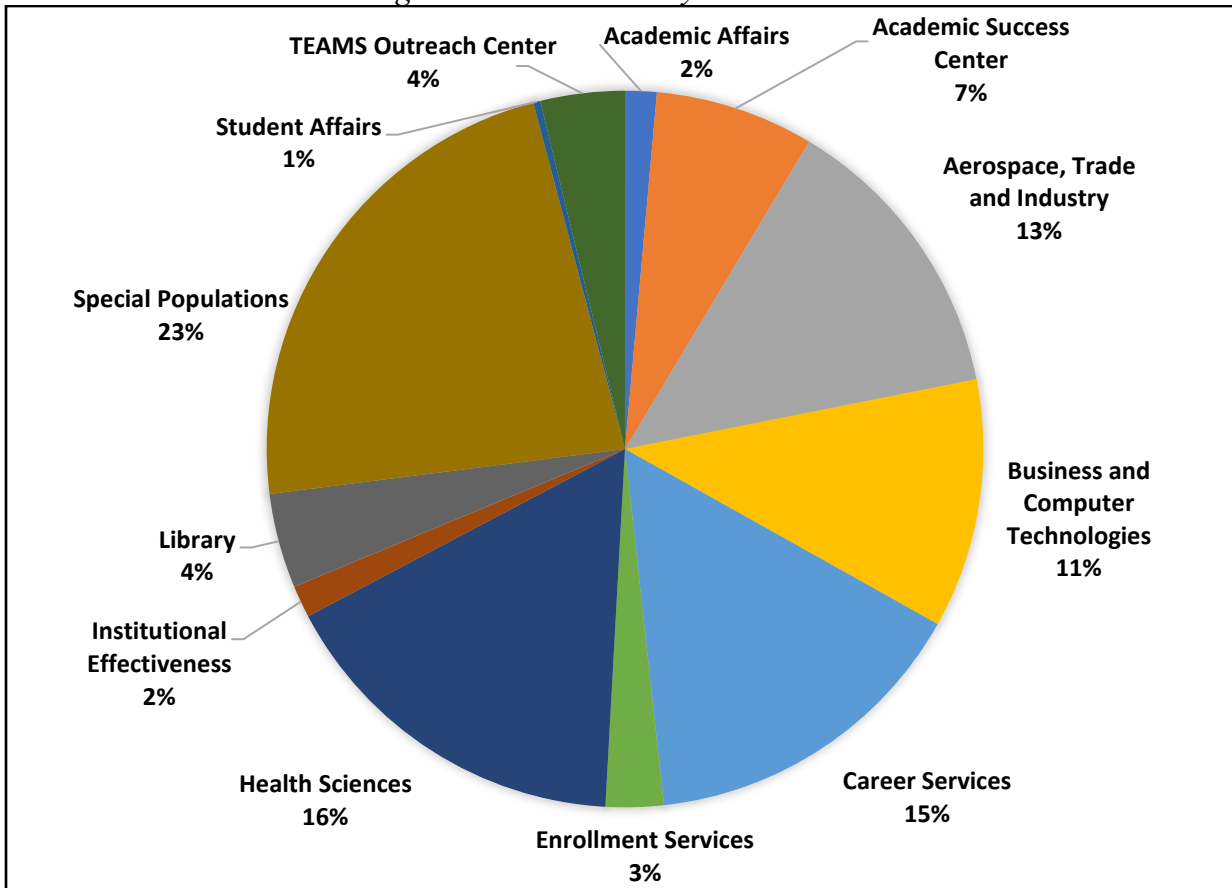
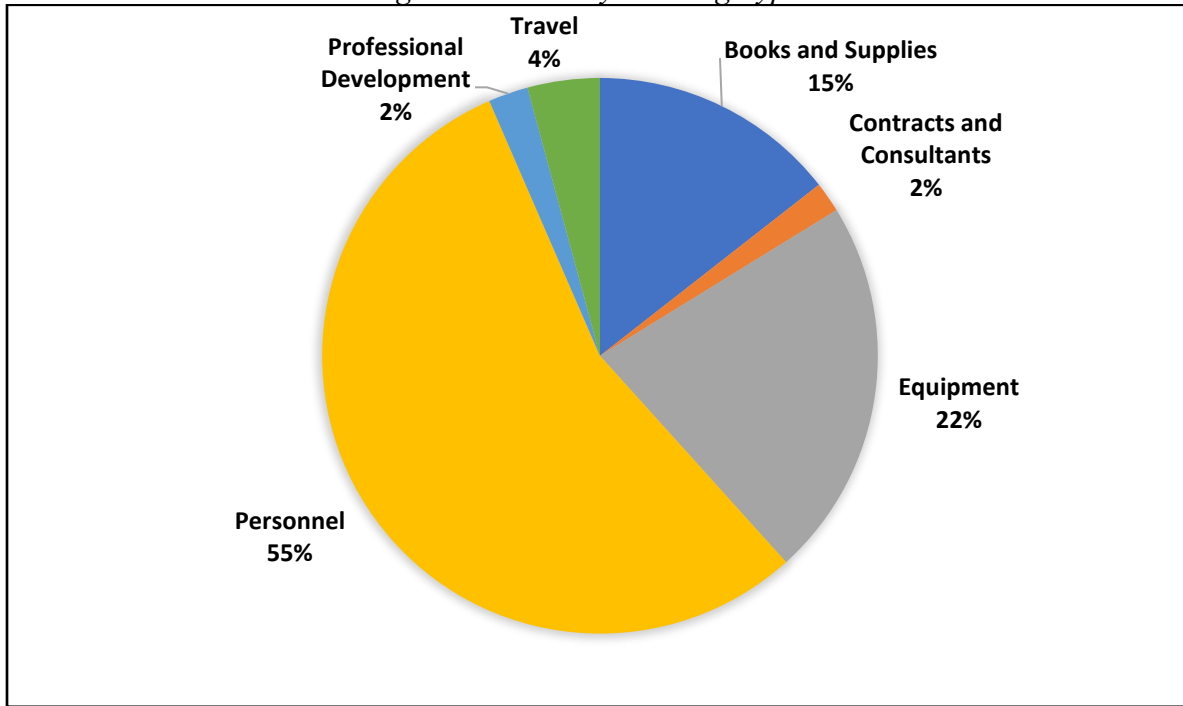


Chart 2. FY27 Perkins Funding Distribution by Funding Type

Central Georgia Technical College has been awarded the WIOA Career and Case Management Services Contract for Fiscal Year 2027/Program Year 2026 by WorkSource Middle Georgia on behalf of the Middle Georgia Workforce Development Board. WIOA Career Advisors conduct career placement activities for participants enrolled in an eligible activity such as being enrolled in a WIOA-approved occupational program, high school equivalency, or high school diploma.

The total number of participants to be served is 75 in the Out of School Youth, Adult, and Dislocated Worker funding categories. As of July 2026, the Advisors are serving 38 total active participants, shown in the table below by funding category. Funding is currently available for Out-of-School Youth and Dislocated Workers.

Apprenticeship

In Fall 2025, WorkSource Middle Georgia was awarded a \$250,000 Top State for Talent Grant to build pre-apprenticeship/apprenticeships pipelines for manufacturing, healthcare, and education, and to create career pathways with sustainable wages & long-term regional impact, serving 100 apprentices by June 30, 2027. In Summer 2026, an additional \$250,000 was awarded. CGTC WIOA Career Advisors will provide outreach and case management for apprentices attending CGTC from within the Local Workforce Delivery Area (LWDA) 11. Registered apprentices will be coded as apprentices and tracked in the WorkSource Georgia Portal.

REACH (Raising Expectations of Achievement): Mentoring Organization

REACH is a student organization supporting student retention. The organization provides mentors who work one-on-one with students and in group sessions, sharing information on topics of interest and topics that support self-sufficiency.

As shown in Table 14, the Summer 2026 REACH virtual sessions successfully supported 38 students, 33 mentors, and 12 guests across four targeted events from June to July. By balancing program introductions with workshops on academic navigation, environmental adaptation, and resilience, the framework built a strong foundation for participant success. The sessions launched on June 11th with a peak of 17 students, fostering a welcoming environment that encouraged continuous participation to prepare for an influx of fall recruits. Beyond these sessions, 7 REACH mentors conducted outreach to over 75 CGTC students during the summer semester, further expanding a digital footprint that has driven over 12,618 webpage views since Fall 2021. To

prepare for the upcoming influx of students enrolling in the Fall 2026 semester, the planned schedule is detailed in Table 15 below:

- On June 18, 2026, a meeting was held with Kate Herman from Bloomberg Philanthropies at Central Georgia Technical College. Representatives from Atrium Health Navicent, Piedmont Macon, Emory Healthcare, Bibb County School District and Houston County School District attended. During the meeting, Ms. Herman was given an overview of the progress on the Healthcare High School Initiative and the healthcare programs in which students will begin enrolling for the upcoming school year. The group also received updates on the progress of the construction project and discussed the continued collaboration among all partners to support the successful implementation of the initiative.
- On June 30, 2026, a meeting was held with the Houston County School District to prepare for the upcoming school year. Updates were provided on program enrollment at the local high schools and the availability of program slots. The group also discussed enhancements to the STEM Pathways webpage to provide clearer and more accessible information for students and parents. Additionally, plans were made for upcoming outreach and promotional events to increase awareness of the available programs and highlight the educational and career opportunities these pathways will provide for participating students.
- On July 2, 2026, a virtual meeting was held with Finn Partners and representatives from Central Georgia Technical College's Marketing and Strategic Initiatives team. During the meeting, updates were provided on the construction progress of the Healthcare High School building and planning efforts for upcoming events supporting the launch of the healthcare pathways. Finn Partners also outlined its role in developing future marketing and communication materials to promote the Healthcare High School initiative.
- From July 21–24, representatives from Central Georgia Technical College, Emory Healthcare, Atrium Health Navicent, Houston County School District, and Bibb County School District attended Bloomberg Philanthropies' third annual Healthcare High School Convening. On July 23, 2026, Dr. Mark Scott presented on long-term project sustainability and participated in a panel discussion. The convening provided valuable opportunities for collaboration, knowledge sharing, and networking with other recipients of the Bloomberg Healthcare Planning Grant.



- On August 6, the Central Georgia Technical College Strategic Initiatives and Marketing departments collaborated with Finn Partners to develop key messaging guidelines for healthcare partners and other stakeholders. These guidelines are designed to ensure consistent, accurate messaging across all communication platforms.
