CGTC will need to provide shorter programs that can be completed in one semester. Offering a shorter automotive program will assist students at the newly converted women's transitional center attain employment with partnered local tire and basic automotive repair services.

Program Description: The Automotive Service Technician certificate is designed to prepare students for careers within the automotive profession. Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: Employment of graphic designers is projected to grow 2 percent from 2024 to 2034, slower than the average for all occupations. Despite limited employment growth, about 20,000 openings for graphic designers are projected each year, on average, over the decade. Most of those openings are expected to result from the need to replace workers who transfer to different occupations or exit the labor force, such as to retire.

Program Description: The Digital Illustration Specialist TCC provides entry-level skills in traditional and digital illustration with courses indrawing, beginning and advanced vector graphics, raster imaging and identity design. Statement of Need for Program in the Service Area: CGTC's Business Technology and Business Healthcare Technology Advisory Committee recommended approval for the Health Information Management Technology Associate of Applied Science (AAS). Employment of health information technologists and medical registrars is projected to grow 15 percent from 2024 to 2034, much faster than the average for all occupations. The volume of electronic health information generated by healthcare providers and patients continues to grow. As a result, more health information technologists will be needed to analyze these vast quantities of data and offer insight to help make informed decisions.

Program Description: The Health Information Management Technology AAS program is a sequence of courses designed to provide students with the technical knowledge and skills necessary to process, maintain, analyze, and report health information data according to legal, accreditation, licensure and certification standards for reimbursement, facility planning, marketing, risk management, utilization management, quality assessment and research; program graduates will develop leadership skills necessary to serve in a functional supervisory role in various components of the health information system.

Fall Semester Update

On Friday, August 14th, over 225 of CGTC's full-time faculty gathered on the Warner Robins Campus for the annual Fall Faculty Kickoff meeting, a day of collaboration and professional development. Faculty heard important news, updates, and processes from key campus leaders, including President Ivan Allen and 2026 CGTC Student of the Year Anna Walters. Thank you to the CGTC Foundation and Student Affairs for sponsoring the Fall Faculty Kickoff.



Academic Support Update

Academic Support partnered with Student Life to host Titan Success Fest on the Macon, Milledgeville, and Warner Robins campuses. These back-to-school events connected students and faculty with key college and community support resources, boosting engagement and setting students up for college success. The events reached 438 students, notably including 101 students on the Milledgeville campus. Check out the photos of smiling faces on CGTC's social media.

Our Academic Support team also recently wrapped up Titan TakeOff, our fall campaign at off-campus instructional sites to orient new dual enrollment students to college life. In the first two weeks of August, the academic support team visited eleven locations and assisted 622 students. Locations included instructional sites in Baldwin, Bibb, Bleckley, Crisp, Houston, Jones, Peach, Pulaski, and Twiggs Counties.

Radiologic Technology Faculty Member Recognition

Amanda Cobb, MSRS, RT(R)(M), Program Chair for Radiologic Technology at Central Georgia Technical College, was among a select group of educators from across the United States chosen to participate in the American Society of Radiologic Technologists (ASRT) Educator Institute, held in the month of April at ASRT headquarters in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Program Highlights

The Phlebotomy program has experienced an increased demand for training. To meet the growing demand, CGTC recently retrofitted labs in Macon (H Building) and Warner Robins (W Building) to become dedicated Phlebotomy labs and purchasing phlebotomy chairs through Perkins funding. This dedicated space and transition to in-house sticks has allowed CGTC to double the capacity in the program for fall semester.

The first cohort of the Certified Personal Trainer program began fall semester with 26 students enrolled. Upon completing the program and obtaining CPR/AED certification with a live skills check, graduates are eligible to take the ACE Personal Trainer Certification exam. Students are able to complete the program in one semester.

The Nurse Aide program on the Macon Campus received a site visit by Alliant on July 28, 2026, resulting in commendations made by the reviewer that records were perfect. The reviewer stated she had never seen such a perfect on-site review and that it was evident CGTC's folks know what they are doing! She also commented on the beautiful facilities at CGTC. Special thanks was given to Ashley Hastings, Program Chairs for Nurse Aide, for coordinating the review of the site.

Ongoing Phishing Attacks

A few days after the Fall semester started we saw an increase in the number of phishing messages that are making it through our filter. We have sent warning emails, with things to look for in malicious messages and what to do when users get them, to all of our faculty, staff, and students. We will be sending similar warning messages at least once a semester so new employees and students are aware of the dangers and how to handle them.

Apprenticeship

In Fall 2025, WorkSource Middle Georgia was awarded a \$250,000 Top State for Talent Grant to build pre-apprenticeship/apprenticeships pipelines for manufacturing, healthcare, and education and create career pathways with sustainable wages & long-term regional impact, serving 100 apprentices by June 30, 2027. In Summer 2026, an additional \$250,000 was awarded. CGTC WIOA Career Advisors will provide outreach and case management for apprentices in the Local Workforce Delivery Area (LWDA) 11 attending CGTC. Registered apprentices will be coded as apprentices and tracked in the WorkSource Georgia Portal.

REACH (Raising Expectations of Achievement): Mentoring Organization

REACH is a student organization supporting student retention. The organization provides mentors who work one-on-one with students and in group sessions, sharing information on topics of interest and topics that support self-sufficiency.

As shown in Table 13, REACH has attended 7 In-person Fall Orientation Resource Fairs and 1 virtual Fall Orientation, during which mentors introduced the program and connected with incoming students. During these events, mentors highlighted academic navigation and resilience workshops, shared information on peer mentorship opportunities, and distributed resources to help recruits adapt to the campus environment.

The Fall list of eligible students was pulled from the Inet2 report and pre-assigned among the REACH mentors. A total of 380 invitation letters were created and mailed to new students, inviting them to attend the REACH Meet and Greet to learn more about the program. Additionally, REACH has been rebranded with a fresh visual identity and updated messaging, effective for the Fall 2026 semester. To keep the momentum going for the increase in student enrollment, Table 14 shows the Upcoming REACH sessions, starting with the Meet and Greet session that took place on August 27th at noon.

- On August 13, the Strategic Initiatives Division attended Parent Night at Houston County Career Academy. The event served as an introductory information session for parents regarding the Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) program. Parents received information about the program, its requirements, and the career opportunities available to students upon completion. Students also received information regarding their participation, expectations, and program requirements. Students were informed that they are members of the inaugural cohort of the Healthcare High School Initiative, marking an important milestone in the development of the program.
- On August 19, 2026, Building Impact hosted a virtual meeting with all Bloomberg Philanthropies Healthcare High School grant recipients. Participants discussed key considerations related to data sharing and reporting requirements. The meeting provided valuable information and guidance to support the preparation of upcoming reporting metrics and deliverables.
- On August 20, 2026, Dr. Mark Scott presented to the Board of Trustees for the Central Georgia Technical College Foundation. The presentation included a review of the budget, an overview of the programs that will be included in the Healthcare High School Initiative, and the checkpoints for awarding student grants.
