Executive Summary

End of Year Report AY2024

Central Georgia Technical College (CGTC) is a two-year public college and unit of the Technical College System of Georgia. CGTC is continuously proving its value to the State of Georgia as it provides educational resources for citizens residing in or near its eleven-county service area of Bibb, Baldwin, Crawford, Dooly, Houston, Jones, Monroe, Peach, Pulaski, Putnam and Twiggs counties, resulting in a skilled workforce that strengthens Georgia's economic stability. The College operates and maintains over one million square feet of existing facilities at more than 50 addresses. CGTC maximizes its reach through traditional, blended, and distance education supported by state-of-the-art technology. The College offers a world-class education at tuition rates that make post-secondary education more affordable for Georgia citizens.

CGTC currently offers associate degrees, diplomas, and technical certificates of credit in the areas of Aerospace, Trade and Industry, Business and Computer Technologies, Health Sciences, Public Safety and Professional Services, and General Studies. The College also offers adult education and customized business and industry training designed to promote community and workforce development. The College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC); many CGTC programs also hold industry-specific accreditations, licensure, and approvals from various state and national agencies. CGTC students benefit from several local and state-wide articulation agreements to facilitate a smooth transfer of earned credits into four-year colleges or universities.

CGTC has a robust dual enrollment program and a formal high school, The CGTC Academy. The Academy offers high school programming under two pathways, the State legislated Dual Achievement Program (DAP) and Career Plus High School Program (CPH). The Academy is accredited by Cognia through the NCA CASI, NWAC and SACS CASI.

In June 2013, the consolidated College was approved by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) to continue as an accredited institution with Level 1 status, with the capacity to grant associate degrees. The consolidated College officially began doing business as Central Georgia Technical College (CGTC) on July 1, 2013.




Figure 1: FY2023 Participants by Financial Aid Type

Highlights

CGTC has always employed the best use of taxpayer dollars to the people it serves. Through the management and operation of accounting, payroll and benefits, inventory and assets, facilities and other human resource functions, CGTC continues to maximize revenues to ensure the community receives the best education services possible.

During Academic Year 2024, CGTC produced more graduates and conferred more awards, as well as, had the highest enrollment - 15,080 a 12.1% increase over AY2023 - among the Technical College System of Georgia (TCSG).

- 1) CGTC had the highest number of graduates (5,238) an increase of 36.5% and conferred the second highest awards (8,112) an increase of 30.6% over AY 2023
 - #1 in associate degrees 933 conferred
 - #0 in dialament 405 and and
 - #2 in diplomas 485 conferred

- #1 in technical certificate of credit 4,793 conferred
- #1 in HOPE Career Grant graduates 2,259
- 2) CGTC led the TCSG in high school dual enrollment with the highest number of students (6,028), graduates (2,611), and awards (8,112) conferred:
 - #1 in associate degrees 308 conferred
- #2 in technical certificate of credit -3,179 conferred

- #5 in diplomas 82 conferred
- 3) The Adult Education Division enrolled the fifth highest total number of students in Adult Basic and Adult Secondary Education and English as a Second Language learners (2,101) and ranked second for total number of Measurable Skill Gains (1,130) within the TCSG.
- 4) The Economic Development Division delivered Customized Contract Training to 278 companies ranking third within the TCSG, but remains first in training hours, totaling 7,296,705.




Figure 2: Unduplicated Graduates and Placement

Reporting Year AY2023 based on AY2022 Graduates




Quality Initiatives

Active Grants FY2024

The Institutional Effectiveness Division provides significant support for grant applications and other competitive funding sources. As a result of these efforts, CGTC currently manages over \$16M in grant funding, with more than \$7.3M supporting College activities during FY2024.

Approximately 55% (\$4,047,297) of FY2024 grant funding came from federal sources, 33% (\$2,449,066) from state government, and 12% (\$894,946) from local government, as shown in the following figure:



During FY2024, eight new applications were submitted for grants and competitive funding totaling \$4,006,073. Six of these applications were awarded, resulting in an additional \$3,220,188 in grant funding for the College.

The Institutional Effectiveness Division pursues funding to support all divisions of the College. Academic Affairs, Student Affairs, (including High School Initiatives and Campus Security), and the Executive Vice President (VECTR) each received support from grants and competitive funding sources during FY2024 to provide quality programming and services while improving student learning and success.





Figure 4: FY2023 Distributions of Funds by Division

The Carl Perkins Grant

The Perkins grant is Federal funding provided to the College through TCSG and the Georgia Department of Education (GADOE). Allocation of funding is not competitive but based on the number of Pell recipients. The College's allocation for FY2024 was \$1,850,945 distributed



Divisions that provide eligible activities in support of grant priorities.

Perkins funds are disbursed to support Personnel, Equipment, Travel, Professional Development, Books and Supplies, Contracts and Consultants. Perkins funding supports negotiated activities devised with internal and external stakeholder input. External stakeholders include, but are not limited, to secondary school systems, business and industry partners, and WorkSource Georgia Region 6 entities. Local Board and Foundation Board members are considered as internal stakeholders for planning purposes.




Figure 6: AY 2024 Perkins Distribution of Funds by Category

Special Populations/Lending Library

The Office of Institutional Effectiveness provides grant management and technical assistance to College departments such as Special Populations. In AY2024, the Office of Special Populations, a unit of the Student Services Division, as recipients of Perkins funding, provided Lending Library services to students throughout the academic year. Many students received assistance during one or more semesters in fall, spring, and/or summer semesters.

REACH

The **R**aising **E**xpectations of **Ach**ievement (REACH) student organization is tailored towards CGTC students that are underserved. While REACH session activities are open to all student demographics, this initiative primarily targets male students of color.

TEAMS Outreach Center

CGTC TEAMS Outreach Center utilizes an internally designed alert system to identify at-risk students, provide individualized support, track the application of interventions, and monitor student success. The goal of the TEAMS Outreach Center is to improve student retention and graduation rates. This goal is met by identifying at-risk students as early in the term as possible and connecting those students to College resources or interventions that can help the student be retained and succeed.

The Academic Success Center offers free tutoring, success skills workshops, and computer assistance. *Students can call, email, or schedule a session through the online platform.*




Figure 8: ASC Session Count AY2023

CGTC Academy

The CGTC Academy offers two alternatives to a traditional high school diploma.

Pathway 1: The <u>Dual Achievement Program Pathway</u> (DAP) offers high school coursework for individuals aged 16 – 21. Enrolled DAP students take high school courses and credit level coursework towards a minimum of two technical certificates of credit leading to an accredited high school diploma and college level credential for quick entry into the workforce.

Pathway 2: The <u>Career Plus High School Equivalency Pathway</u> (CPH) offers high school coursework for individuals aged 21 and over. CPH students earn a high school equivalency diploma and a college level credential.





Figure 9: Total Completion Rate








Figure 11: Total Completion Rate by Race/Ethnicity¹




Figure 13: IPEDS 2022-23 Data Collection System - Completions Survey




Figure 14: IPEDS 2022-23 Data Collection System - Completions Survey




Figure 16: IPEDS 2022-23 Prior Year Data Revision System – IPEDS Student Financial Aid (SFA) Survey Summary





Figure 17: Awards Conferred by Award Level




Figure 19: Two-Year Total Award Count




Figure 20: Enrollment by CGTC County of Residence




Figure 21: Top 5 Programs Based on Total Credit Hours

Total Credit Enrollment, Credit Hours, and FTE

Total students enrolled in credit courses, total credit hours taken by these students, and total full time equivalent (FTE). Annual FTE is the sum of all credit hours for the academic year (Fall, Spring, and Summer semesters) divided by 30 and rounded down. Percent change is from same term of previous year to current term.

Unduplicated Graduates:

Each graduate is counted once regardless of how many awards received. A graduate who receives 2 TCCs and 1 Diploma = 1 graduate.

Awards Conferred (duplicated):

A graduate is counted for each award received, so one graduate can be counted multiple times if receiving multiple awards. A graduate who receives 2 TCCs and 1 Diploma = 3 awards.

Placement Formulas:

Placement Rates are based on unduplicated Graduates and unduplicated Employment Status, using the latest Employment Status entry for each student.
